Course Goals or Overview:	The goals of this course are as follows - The goal of this course is for students to understand how learners acquire their second language while maintaining their first. They will be expected to interpret relevant SLA ¹ research in ways that will benefit them as teachers working with bilingual populations. In this light, the research in this area should become an essential point of reference for those involved in educational activities and pedagogies that facilitate the language learning process.

6	Define the individual factors that can influence SL processing		
7	Evaluate the role of language teaching methodologies in SLA processes		
8	Select approaches that provide opportunities for different performance modes during language instruction		
9	Develop and present a lesson plan based on established language teaching methodologies		
10	Link language learning concepts with their prior experiences and the experiences of others

Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

1. **Notebook Check:** Be prepared for announced and/or unannounced evaluations ensuring that students are taking annotated notes on all class readings, are taking notes on online videos, are completing weekly Question/Ah-ha!, and are generally keeping their notebooks organized
2. **Anchor Chart:** Create a poster-sized anchor chart on an assigned grammar topic. Take picture of chart and add to SeeSaw app. Hang poster in classroom.
3. **Homework:** Submit a written or electronic response to a question or prompt.
4. **Debate:** Represent a specific language acquisition theory in an informal in-class debate (Group Project)
5. **Activity Demonstration:** Demonstrate an ESL activity for the class (Group Project) and write up an evaluation of the activity (Individual).
6. **ELL Interview Essay**– Interview an ELL and write an essay evaluating the ELL’s experience in light of content learned in LING4030
7. **Mid-Term and Final Exam:** Assessment designed to measure knowledge of course content; questions types might include multiple choice, true/false, short answer, or essay; notebook may be used during exam. Mid-Term is online. Final Exam is face-to-face.
