Course Goals:

This is an advanced course designed to improve the writing, oral, listening and reading skills of heritage Spanish speakers as well as native speakers.

- 3. Video Presentation Techniques
- 4. Interactive Activities Design

Learning Objectives/Outcomes:

- 1. Students will demonstrate linguistic competence in Spanish. Specifically, they will be able to write coherent, unified, and complete paragraphs, and write grammatically correct, stylistically pleasing, and diverse sentences, free of punctuation and spelling errors, without anglicisms, code switches or structures that are transferences from English.
- 2. Students will apply the principles of letter writing to various types of correspondence
- 3. Students will apply standard grammar and orthography rules in context.
- 4. Students will demonstrate the ability to communicate orally in formal contexts
- 5. Students will demonstrate the ability to understand and analyze literature written in the target language.
- 6. Students will use specialized vocabulary in context

*We will progress through the Chapters as possible. The weekly schedule is an estimate of where the class will be by certain weeks.

*In addition to the book and online activities, we will engage in other interactive cultural and linguistic activities inside and outside of the classroom.

Course Evaluation Methods:

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Attendance and participation (10%)

Class participation will be assessed regularly throughout the semester (unannounced) and will be based on communicative activities carried out during class time. There will be a minimum of one class participation grade per chapter, although more participation grades may also be given at the discretion of the instructor. Students who are absent on the day of a class participation grade will receive a zero for participation on that day. Exemptions from class participation grades are only given to students who provide an excuse on university letterhead or who miss a class due to active duty military obligations.

Quizzes in class and Online activities (30%)

Each module contains mandatory work in the vhlcenter.com online site.

Oral Presentations (20%)

Oral presentations are designed to measure ability to apply presented course material on the research topic assigned in the class.

Essays (20%)

Writing assignments are an essential part of this course. Essays are designed to measure performance on the different modes of writing.

Exams (20%)

Raw scores will be converted to percentages according to students' prior knowledge and proficiency levels. The written tests are designed to measure knowledge of presented course material.
